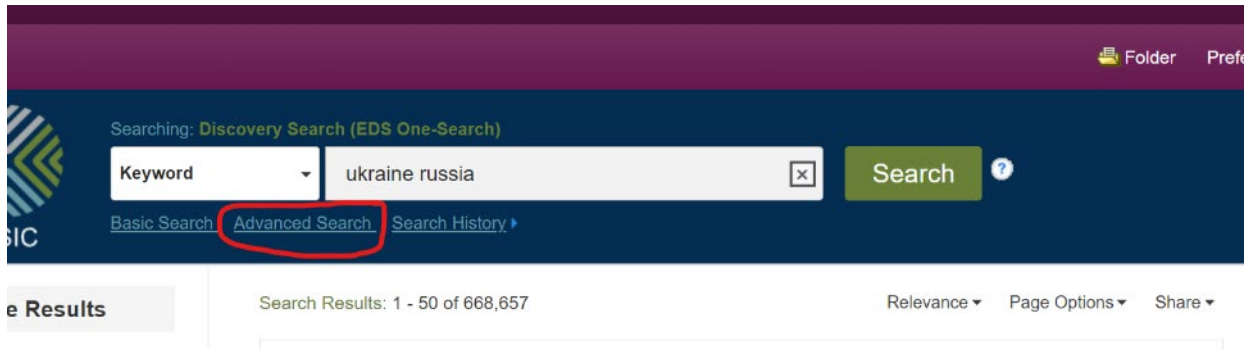

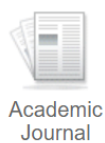
USIC Advanced Searching

Under the search bar there is a link to an **Advanced Search**. This is useful if you want to do a more focused search. It's helpful to first find an article that fits your topic well.



If *Dynamics of Ukraine-Russia Relations* looks like a great source for your research, use the “**Subjects:**” phrases and words to help you do an advanced search. Note that our search words are bolded, and that Russia has the subject word *Soviet Union*. **Subjects** are terms assigned by the database to describe resources of the same topic.

1. Dynamics of **Ukraine-Russia** Relations.

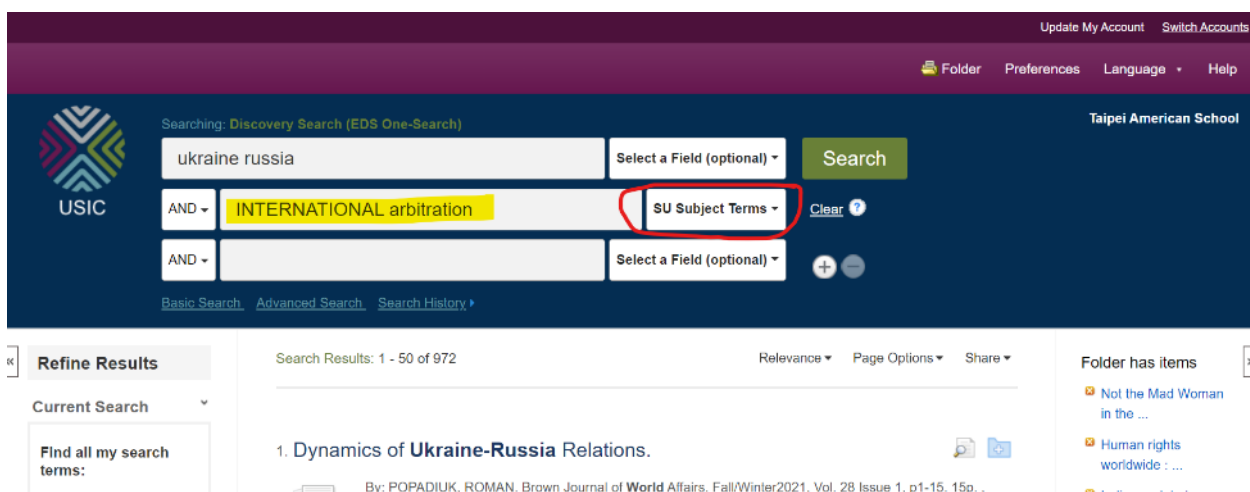

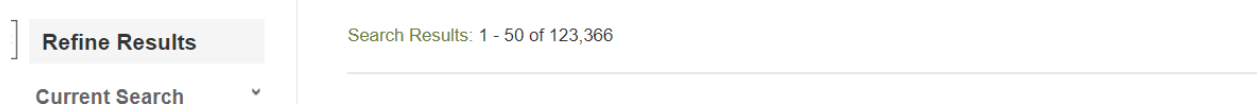
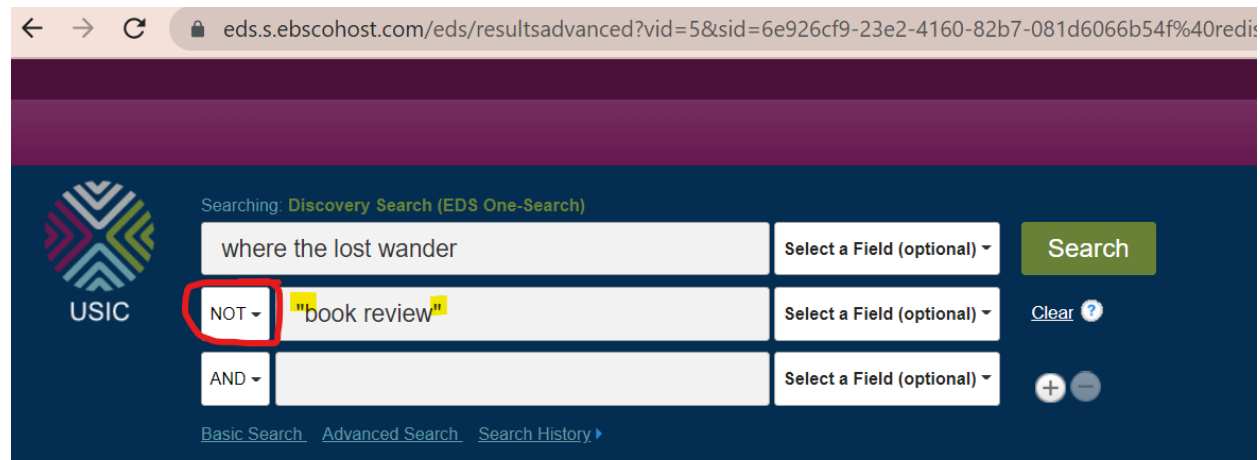
Put the phrase International Arbitration as a Subject Term. **Note: you must change the drop-down menu circled in red to *SU Subject Terms*. When we do the search, there are fewer results, but the results will be more relevant.**



USIC Advanced Search

*Please note: if your advanced search gives you too little results, use keyword search with limiters again, exclude words with "NOT" or use "OR" instead of "AND". Also, [Google Scholar](#) is worth searching.

To exclude book reviews, put "book review" in quotes and change the AND to NOT on the left side.



Extra tips on getting better results in USIC Search

- Put quotes around phrases – this will tell the search to find that phrase in that exact order only!
- Use AND in between two or more search words to make sure all the words are the results.
- If you change the AND to OR, you will broaden your search as your results will include articles with Ukraine Russia, OR International Arbitration.
- Choosing NOT will exclude words and narrow your results. Often you will NOT want *book* reviews. (See image below)
- Truncation: Enter a minimum of the first three characters followed by an asterisk (*). As an example: 'architectur*' finds resources containing "architecture", "architectures", or "architecturally"
- Wildcards: Use the pound sign (#) to represent a single character (for example 'wom#n' will find woman and women)
